new plants

We usually pass on new discoveries, often from the RHS, but this time it is worth wondering how many old varieties we have allowed to disappear from our tables - edibles that used to be common but seem exotic to the new generation of gardeners. How many people now eat

kohlrabi, related to wild cabbage? You can fry the roots, use the leaves in a salad and even eat the stems.

Salsify is another edible root you don't see often in Worthing, although it tastes like artichoke heart without the aggro and is a cure for snake bites if the adder ever comes back.

Celeriac is a kind of celery-flavoured potato replacement, and Jerusalem artichokes could also be used instead of spuds.

Samphire, or 'sea asparagus', samphire is supposed to grow in rocky, salt-sprayed regions and goes well with fish in very expensive restaurants. Ever seen any locally?

If you still use any of these traditional crops, perhaps you could use our forum and let us know if they are worth the space? worthingallotments.freeforums.org/bring-back-the-old-stuff-t66.html

And if you really want something new, try Romanesco, a sort of broccoli/ cauliflower with a head that looks like a mathematical puzzle - in fact it develops fractals on the Fibonanacci¹ system. Crunchy, delicate tasting and weird - what's not to like?



As for **visits**, why not wander around your local site or area and see what other people are growing. Poke you head over the privet or compost bin and make a connection.
